single time.

**Imagine** walking into a completely dark room and closing the door. You can see nothing, not even your hand before

your face. You reach for the light switch and lift it up. Boom! Let there be light. The light immediately overtakes the darkness, and you can see again.

We keep this limited analogy in mind as we ponder this Sunday the Epiphany of the Magi.

Let's break down the word Epiphany. There are two Greek words: epi and phaino. Epi means "on, upon," and phaino means "to appear, to shine." The Epiphany refers to the divinity of Jesus "shining upon" the earth. In other words, it is the manifestation of his divine nature.

The baby born of Mary is the enfleshment of God, the Incarnation. The Second Person of the Holy Trinity took to Himself human flesh while remaining fully divine. Christ is the Light you. What you become is your gift to of the world.

Our first reading from Isaiah reads, "Rise up in splendor Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you."

Jesus is the long-awaited Messiah that the prophets of old foretold. Christ is the Word of God made flesh. He came not to live but to die so that we might have life. This is the eternal Light that overtakes the darkness. Sin, evil, and death are eternally conquered through the suffering, death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus.

Our Gospel on the Epiphany of the Lord features the arrival of the Magi. These educated star-gazers travel in search of the "newborn king of the Jews." They are sincere seekers of

Light overtakes truth and allow truth to guide them. darkness every This stands in contrast to King Herod, who uses deception to ascertain the whereabouts of this "baby king."

> Herod said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage."

The earthly king had no intention of giving homage to baby Jesus. His sinister intention was to seek out the baby and have him murdered. As is so often the case, a person's evil intention is hidden behind an apparent good. Herod said he wanted to give the baby homage. That's the lie that is juxtaposed with the sincere seeking of

Notice the reaction of the Magi once they encounter Truth. "They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered collection. him gifts of gold, frankincense and

The Magi bring gifts to the one who is our Eternal Gift; a wonderful reciprocity of love. How are we responding to this same Gift?

Theologian Hans Urs von Balthasaar wrote, "What you are is God's gift to

Who are we becoming? Do we allow truth and love to guide us toward the Light? Or have we been tricked by the Herods of our world – in cooperation with the Enemy -- into seeking God's "elimination?" The Magi model for us right worship. Herod reveals to us rebelliousness to God's love and God's law. Hence, the spiritual battle we all experience in our hearts: to worship God as God, or not to worship God, which eventually becomes worship of the self.

We are invited to RECEIVE the Gift of Christmas - Light breaking into our world; to RETURN this Gift with our love; and to SHARE this Gift of Good News with the world. By allowing the Light of Christ into our hearts,

we become little lights (little Christs) amidst to the darkness of this world, knowing full well that in the end, Light triumphs. Love never fails.

# FR. MATT'S REFLECTION



On this Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, we recall the Magi, their diligent searching for "'the newborn king of the Jews,'"

(Matthew 2:2) and their rejoicing at finding Him. In the week since Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI died, some of his prophetic words seem to exemplify the current challenge for people to seek Christ as did the Magi:

"Let us dwell on only two points. The first is the journey towards 'the maturity of Christ.' ... More precisely, in accordance with the Greek text, we should speak of the 'measure of the fullness of Christ' that we are called to attain if we are to be true adults in the faith. We must not remain children in faith, in the condition of minors. And what does it mean to be children in faith? St. Paul answers: it means being 'tossed here and there, carried about by every wind of doctrine' (Eph 4: 14). This description is very timely!

How many winds of doctrine have we known in recent decades, how many ideological currents, how many ways of thinking. The small boat of the thought of many Christians has often been tossed about by these waves—flung from one extreme to another: from Marxism to liberalism, even to libertinism; from collectivism to radical individualism; from atheism to a vague religious mysticism; from agnosticism to syncretism and so forth. Every day new sects spring up, and what St. Paul says about human deception and the trickery that strives to entice people into error (cf. Eph 4: 14) comes true.

Today, having a clear faith based on the Creed of the Church is often labeled as fundamentalism. Whereas relativism, that is, letting oneself be "tossed here and there, carried about by every wind of doctrine" seems the only attitude that can cope with modern times. We are building a dictatorship of relativism that does not recognize anything as definitive and whose ultimate goal consists solely of one's own ego and desires.

We, however, have a different goal: the Son of God, the true man. He is the measure of true humanism. An 'adult' faith is not a faith that follows the trends of fashion and the latest novelty; a mature adult faith is deeply rooted in friendship with Christ. It is this friendship that opens us up to all that is good and gives us a criterion by which to distinguish the true from the false, and deceit from truth.

We must develop this adult faith; we must guide the flock of Christ to this faith. And it is this faith — only faith — that creates unity and is fulfilled in love ... Make truth in love. Truth

and love coincide in Christ. To the extent that we draw close to Christ, in our own lives too, truth and love are blended ... Our redemption is brought about in this communion of wills: being friends of Jesus, to become friends of God. The more we love Jesus, the more we know him. the more our true freedom develops and our joy in being redeemed flourishes. Thank you, Jesus, for your friendship! ... We must be enlivened by a holy restlessness: a restlessness to bring to everyone the gift of faith, of friendship with Christ. Truly, the love and friendship of God was given to us so that it might also be shared with others ... So let us go and pray to the Lord to help us bear fruit that endures. Only in this way will the earth be changed from a valley of tears to a garden of God." What we believe and pray: That our joy, not temporary excitement but lasting happiness, comes from and with God.

What to stop doing, sins to avoid: Is there a part of our life where we equivocate on what is morally good and true, where we are being relativistic?

What to do: Now is a good time to change to act accord with our faith, with what fosters friendship with Christ.

"And behold, I [Jesus] am with you always, until the end of the age." - MATTHEW 28:20

# What to do at a Holy Hour?

# AN EASY TO USE GUIDE ON HOW TO PRAY

Ever try to pray only to soon find out you don't know what to by confessing our sins and receiving his forgiveness. Come to confess on: do? Ever visit a Holy Hour in front of the Monstrance and become frustrated because you didn't know what to do?

Here are a few suggestions as to how to make a good holy hour.

MINUTES 0-5: Meditate on the following quote from the Catechism of the Catholic Church: "God calls man first. Man may forget his Creator or hide far from his face; he may run after idols or accuse the deity of having abandoned him; yet the living and true God tirelessly calls each person to that mysterious encounter known as prayer. In prayer, God's initiative of love always comes first; our own first step is always a response." (no. 2567)

MINUTES 5-10: Look in your heart; look at your life. What do you want? What do you really want from God? Tell God right now what you need from Him during this time of prayer.

**MINUTES 10-15:** Find a passage from the Bible. Maybe it's a Psalm; maybe it's the readings from daily Mass; maybe it's the readings at the upcoming Sunday Mass. Find a passage from Scripture. Read the passage slowly. Get familiar with the text. Read the passage a second time, this time read it even slower. Very, very slowly read the passage a third time. Pay attention to which word, words, or phrases "tug" at your heart or get your attention.

MINUTES 15-25: Think about your life; think about the reality of your life. What are the word, words, or phrases from the Bible speaking to in your life? How does the Bible passage connect to your life? Look deep within.

MINUTES 25-35: Talk to God. Talk to God as if He were a real person. Talk to God like Moses did: "The Lord used to speak to Moses face to face, as one man speaks to another." (Exodus 33:11)

MINUTES 35-45: Listen. God will speak to you. Maybe God will speak to you through a thought in your head ... or a song in your heart .... or a memory ... or a feeling in your body. Listen with all your senses.

MINUTES 45-50: Return to the Scripture passage again. Read it slowly one more time. Is there any word, words, or phrases that speak to you again?

MINUTES 50-55: What can you do today, this week, to act on what God has revealed to you? Practically speaking, in your real life, what can you do?

MINUTES 55-60: Thank the Lord. Blessings are specific and so should our gratitude. Tell God specifically what you're thankful for.
