My dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

Wishing you and your loved ones a Happy Easter.

Today specifically, but throughout the year, we live with the hope that love is stronger than death. We proclaim Christ crucified and risen from the dead. The "Alleluia" returns to our liturgy, and it means "Praise the Lord."

Through the cross is the promise of a new life.

Please ponder the following two words throughout the Easter season, which runs through Pentecost (May 19).

The two words are: **grace** and **gratitude**.

Why grace? Because we need God's grace. Sanctifying grace is available to us in this world thanks be to Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit. To say we don't need grace in the spiritual life is like saying we don't need oxygen in the physical life. We need oxygen. We need grace.

Why gratitude? Because of what Christ has done for us that we were not capable of doing on our own. His suffering, death, resurrection and ascension pave the way for new life in this world and for eternal life. Jesus says, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

Our tears of sorrow in the reality of Good Friday transform into tears of joy on Easter. Only the risen Lord can boldly say to us, "Do not be afraid." When we truly walk this earthly life heart-to-heart with the Lord, we need not live in fear. When crippling fear enters our life, we can be certain we've lost our trust in God, or we've forgotten what Easter is about.

Easter points us beyond bodily death to the promise of resurrection. Humanity has a 100 percent mortality rate. We might not like this fact, but it is a fact.

Our physical body has an expiration date, but as human beings we are more than our physical body. We are body and soul. We are embodied souls.

The soul is immortal.

The promise of Christ is that one day our immortal soul is joined to a glorified body in a new heaven and new earth.

God makes this possible; not Jeff Bezos, not Bill Gates, not Oprah, not the next president, whoever that might be. All things are possible for God.

Jesus says, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live. And everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." Jesus then asks Martha, "Do you believe this?"

Martha answered yes. What about you? Do you believe Jesus truly is the resurrection and the life? It's a yes or no question.

Ponder these words from scripture scholar N.T. Wright.

He wrote, "Our task in the present ... is to live as resurrection people in between Easter and the final day, with our Christian life, corporate and individual, in both worship and

mission, as a sign of the first and a foretaste of the second."

In this world, we are mere pilgrims. We're passing through.

Our citizenship, however, is in heaven. And yet, we use our God -given time on Earth to love God and to love neighbor; to live both worship and service. We are people of hope, and the truth of Jesus is the reason for our hope.

Our faith becomes God's love working in and through each one of us.

As many of you have heard me preach, there cannot be two truths about Jesus. He either is or he isn't. He either rose from the dead, or he did not. If he did not, then yes, our faith is a lie or mere fantasy. But if he did? Then it truly is the GOOD NEWS OF VICTORY. Love is stronger than death, and we sing "Alleluia."

Will we be mocked for our faith? Yes, as Jesus was mocked. Will we be laughed at? Yes, as Jesus was laughed at. Will we be hated? Yes, as Jesus was hated.

Will we be persecuted? Yes, as Jesus was persecuted. Will we have to carry a cross? Yes, as Jesus carried his cross.

Will we die? Yes, as Jesus died. Will we rise from the dead? "Behold, I make all things new."

Grace and gratitude, all the way Home. Happy Easter !!!





Alleluia! CristoV anesth! AlhqwV anesth! That's the traditional Greek greeting for the Easter season (it's pronounced, "Christos anestei, aleithos anestei"). It means, "Christ is risen! Truly he is risen!" A happy and most blessed Easter to you and your families.

The Sacred Triduum rightly is the most solemn and most unique of the liturgies in the Church year. We don't need to do anything extra; it's just a matter of being present and experiencing the beauty of each of the aspects of the three-day liturgy. Since it's Easter, we'll turn our attention to the Easter Vigil and the Masses of Easter Day.

If you've ever been to the Easter Vigil, you probably remember it as the Mass that begins in the dark and has a bunch of readings. Maybe you remember holding your own candle as a child. Maybe you've attended to see a family member be baptized or received into the full communion of the Church.

Maybe you've even dozed off since the Mass is later in the evening (it's not supposed to begin until sunset).

There are several elements dripping with meaning that communicate God's salvation to us.

FR. KEVIN'S GREGORIAN RANTS

The Mass begins with the blessing of the Easter fire outside the Church and the creation of the Paschal Candle.

A cross, the year, and the alpha and the omega (the beginning and the end of the Greek alphabet) are carved or traced into a large candle made primarily of beeswax. The priest says, "Christ yesterday and today, the Beginning and the End, the Alpha and the Omega; all time belongs to him and all the ages, to him be glory and power through every age and forever."

He then insets five grains of incense with large pins, representing the five wounds of Christ (hands, feet, and side), while stating, "By his holy and glorious wounds, may Christ the Lord guard us and protect us." The candle is lit and processed into the darkened church. A smoking thurible full of incense proceeds the candle. This recalls the pillars of smoke and fire that guided the Israelites through the desert and the Red Sea as they fled slavery in Egypt.

As the candle is processed in, the people begin to light their candles from the Paschal candle, which quickly spreads through the church as the light of Christ is passed along to others. Once the candle reaches the front, the Exsultet is proclaimed by a priest or deacon.

I could do several columns of this beautiful and epic chanted prayer, and I plan to do that next week as we close out the Easter Octave. For now, we'll say that the Exsultet sings of the triumph of God over sin and death and the rejoicing the Church now is able to do. It speaks of what we celebrate on this most holy of nights: the Passover feast, the freedom from slavery to sin, and

Christ's victory over death and isolation.

This is the night of rejoicing for all Christians to share. As the Exsultet states about the Paschal Candle: "A fire into many flames divided, yet never dimmed by sharing of its light."

We then listen to a number of readings from the Old Testament that highlight the key moments of salvation history.

This culminates with the singing of the Gloria as the altar candles are lit and the church bells ring out. We hear from St. Paul's letter to the Romans and then the gospel account of the Resurrection, following the singing of the Alleluia for the first time since Lent began.

After the Homily, RCIA candidates are baptized, confirmed, and received into the Church, and the new waters are blessed. As the faithful, we each renew our baptismal promises and are sprinkled with the Easter waters. This renewal and sprinkling also happens on Easter Day.

From there, it is a familiar Mass: the offertory, the Eucharistic prayer, and the reception of holy communion.

The tabernacle is again filled and the red sanctuary lamp lit.

The risen Christ remains truly with us in the Eucharist.






