FR. BOB'S WEEKLY BLOG



Etched in my memory as a little boy was being sent to school a couple times a year with a small brown envelope that contained the tuition check for St. Leonard Grammar School in

Berwyn.

I'm fairly certain the checks were made out for \$150.00 per semester. This might seem shocking to us now, but back in the late 1970s and early 1980s this was a good chunk of change, and my mom and dad made the financial sacrifice for me to attend. They also did this for my five siblings who proceeded me. We were not poor but we certainly were not rich.

We learned how to read, how to write, and how to do math. We studied history. We learned about art and music, along with the importance of physical exercise. There was, however, another dimension involved by attending a Catholic school. Our faith was supported and nurtured. God mattered. Jesus mattered, and who we were becoming as human beings mattered. We learned about right and wrong; what was good for us and what was not good for us. Even if we decided to cross the line, we knew we had crossed the line.

The mission of Catholic schools continues today. Our children learn the academic basics, no doubt. Parents who send their children to St. Symphorosa School (the parish school of Two Holy Martyrs) can be assured their children are learning, but they are also being invited to deepen their faith, and learn more about the Person of Jesus.

Parents have the responsibility to raise their children and to educate their children. This is a great responsibility. One option is to home school their child, but if that is not their choice, then a parent must decide where to send

is an excellent choice. We know there are other options on the table. Parents should explore and investigate before making a final choice. We have a quality principal who cares, competent teachers who are committed, and a staff that supports the mission of helping our children learn.

My invitation as pastor of Two Holy Martyrs is that our parishioners support our school. How? Prayer, for sure. Pray for our school children and their respective families. We can also volunteer time. Help out in some capacity. And of course, help financially. The school welcomes donations, or parishioners who would like to sponsor the tuition of a child.

Our parish school requires a \$5,000 a year tuition for one child. Let's put this into comparison. According to recent numbers, the average cost per student for Chicago Public Schools is roughly \$29,000 per student. Public school is not free. Tax money is used to support CPS.

We no longer have our Catholic schools staffed by religious sisters. Those nuns of yesteryear taught us as part of their mission and religious order. Today, most of our teachers are lay teachers who need to be paid a salary with benefits. We truly believe a Catholic school education is an investment in your child, not just a tuition payment. We do, however, need this tuition money to keep our school functioning on a day-to-day basis.

This week, we celebrate Catholic Schools Week. We are proud of our principals, teachers, and staff members across the country who follow their call to teach and form our children as part of the mission of the Church, which is the mission of Christ.

God bless our school children, school families, our principal, our teachers and our staff.

much larger than our own specific parish. We are part of an archdiocese, which is part of the Universal Church. This Annual Catholic Appeal is important to the mission of the Church.

How is money from the ACA used? Here is a breakdown: 29 percent serving parishes and schools in financially challenged communities; 22 percent back to parishes that reach their ACA goals; 16 percent to archdiocesan ministries; 11 percent for spiritual renewal efforts; 6 percent for priest formation; 5 percent for scholarships; 4 percent for Catholic Relief Services; and 7 percent for cost of the appeal.

Please consider what you are able to contribute this year for the Annual Catholic Appeal, and please make the commitment.

Being a priest in the trenches of parish life, I often hear from folks who flat out don't trust the Archdiocese of Chicago. There is usually a story involved; and definitely a hurt or resentment of some kind. Folks eagerly give to their respective parish, but want nothing to do with the archdiocese.

My response? I understand. There has been – and still is – a trust factor at times. We need to restore trust. That being said, consider this: we all pay taxes each year to our local, state, and federal government. Take a look at how much of your check gets taken out for taxes. If you do not pay your taxes in a timely fashion, you are heavily fined, and possibly over time, jailed.

Do we approve of how every dime of our tax money is used? Are we assured our tax money won't be wasted on government bloat? Are we assured our tax money isn't being used for corruption? Do we like how much money we spend federally each year on wars?

I offer this just for consideration. The mission of the Church is important in our world today. Her core mission is spiritual – the salvation of souls, but her infrastructure and programs need financial support. You don't HAVE TO. You are not fined or jailed for not their child to school. FR. MATT'S REFLECTION



After Jesus' initial public preaching, "'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand,"" (Matthew 4:17) St Matthew then reports that Jesus begins to cure people, accomplishing a miracle of

healing for them. At this time in Jesus' public ministry, such healings are not a focus. As He moves about from one town to another, Jesus will heal people of a variety of ailments. On some occasions, the evangelists present these interactions with more detail whereas at other times the authors make only brief references to these revelations of Jesus' healing power. This Sunday we move from the Son of God's concise initial proclamation about repentance and the presence of the Kingdom of God to the first large scale congregation who approach the Lord and listen to Him. This inaugural gathering is known as the Sermon on the Mount and it spans three chapters, one of the single longest texts of Jesus' preaching across the four Gospel. The famed Beatitudes, what we hear in the Gospel Reading today, are Jesus' opening teaching of this sermon.

Differing from the readings on some Sundays in which a particular person, named or unnamed, is central, the readings on this Sunday do not focus on a particular individual. Instead, the teachings from St. Zephaniah, "Seek the Lord, all you humble of the earth," (Zephaniah 2:3); St. Paul, "Consider your own calling, brothers and sisters," (1 Corinthians 1:26); and Jesus, "When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain, and after he had sat down, his disciples came to him. He began to teach them," all are wide in scope, open to many people, not directed at someone specific. We certainly learn from those interactions and God's revelation when the readings present us with more of a one-on-one dialogue, the details and setting can seem relatable. Simultaneously though, readings, such as the Sermon on the Mount, with masses of people hearing Jesus speak in the open air are no less relevant for us.

What St. Paul will later write to the body of the Church in Corinth, the faithful of that early Catholic Church, remains applicable of us today: "Consider your own calling, brothers and sisters. Not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth.... It is due to him [God the Father] that you are in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, as well as righteousness, sanctification, and redemption, so that, as it is written, 'Whoever boasts, should boast in the Lord.'" (1 Corinthians 1:26, 30-31) Such a calling is possible because our Lord's work of "righteousness, sanctification, and redemption," is offered to all people, not a small fraction of the world's population.

Among the Beatitudes, which Jesus distinguishes, we hear "Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied." (Matthew 5:6) Relatedly, Jesus then adds, "Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 5:10) The Savior has not yet revealed how this righteousness will be achieved, what He will later do to accomplish and extend the gift of right-relation with God to humanity, but He calls, "Blessed," those who already thirst for righteousness and those who are willing to suffer for it.

Considering each of the Beatitudes, they are challenging to our internal passions

and contemporary attitudes yet they are not esoteric, accessible only to an elite group. To be "poor in spirit," humble, rather than boastful or thinking ourselves self-righteous, that is possible for us. To be "meek," willing to pass by unnoticed and not quick to take personal offense, rather than ostentatious and easily slighted, that is possible for us. To be "clean of heart," what we choose dwell upon, focusing on Christ, rather than choosing to give quarter to proud, lustful, or vengeful thoughts and desires and trying to justify such self-indulgent decisions, that is possible for us. In these and all of the Beatitudes, we not only receive them as God's word but then go to God, "poor in spirit," asking that He grant to us the grace to practice and persevere in the Beatitudes. Practicing the Beatitudes is how we might be more "in Christ Jesus," as St. Paul will later profess. Although we were not there in the crowd that first hears Jesus announce the Beatitudes, their practice and their accompanying promises extend to us and have been hallmarks of the holy women and men who have transmitted the Catholic faith to us. When much seems chaotic and depressing in the world because of the evil, which some people do, the Beatitudes are an antidote, a way of countering with goodness.

What we believe and pray: Last Sunday, the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, has been designated Sunday of the Word of God. Have you begun reading the Scriptures daily? What to stop doing, sins to avoid: Stop being boastful or desiring to be praised, this is St. Paul's warning.

What to do: Go back to the Beatitudes, the beginning of chapter five in St. Matthew's Gospel and ask God which of them He wants you to practice more intentionally at this time.

"And behold, I [Jesus] am with you always, until the end of the age." - MATTHEW 28:20

Building a Better Tomorrow for Those in Need

Dear Parishioners,

As we start the New Year, the Members of the Two Holy Martyrs Saint Vincent de Paul Society would like to **Thank You** for your generosity and support. We would also like to take this opportunity to tell you more about what we do and how we do it.

During 2022, we were able to provide the following assistance.

- At Easter, we were able to deliver Easter plants to 19 of our shut ins
- At Thanksgiving, we were able to provide Gift Cards and Food Vouchers to 17 of our neediest families (26 adults and 10 children).
- For Thanksgiving, one of our retired members purchased three turkey's that were delivered to three of our neediest families
- For Christmas, one of our retired members purchased six hams that were delivered to six of our neediest families
- For Christmas, the UBAM organization donated food baskets that they paid for and delivered to eight of our neediest senior citizen families (11 adults).
- For Christmas, Crosstown Garage Door donated and delivered food baskets to thirteen of to our neediest families (27 adults and 15 children).
- For Christmas, SVdP provided Popcorn Tins, Gift Cards and Food Vouchers to 22 of our neediest families (39 adults and 26 children).
- Throughout the year, we were able to provide assistance in one or more of the following forms: Food Vouchers, Gift Cards, Rent and/or Utility payments, Car Repair, Adult Diapers, Clothing, etc. to a total of 58 families that consisted of 89 adults and 59 children.

None of this would have been possible without the support of our parishioners. How do we receive support to provide this assistance

- The THM Thanksgiving Collection is designated for SVdP
- The Poor Boxes located on both campuses
