# FR. BOB'S WEEKLY BLOG



Jesus thirsts.

It's true. He thirsts not for earthly water. He thirsts for souls to receive his love, return his love, and share his love with others.

Our Gospel this Sunday offers us the story of the woman at the well. It's a passage loved by many, especially for those whose lives were once wayward, but whose lives now have a new direction thanks to an encounter with the merciful Lord.

We could spend the rest of 2023 simply reflecting on this passage. It's that deep.

Jesus reveals to this Samaritan woman that he is the long-awaited Messiah. There is a slow progression in her realization of his identity, but in the end, Human beings are wired for worship, this once-isolated woman returns to town to share the good news with other misdirected away from God and onto

people.

Once we've truly encountered the Lord, we can no longer keep the good news to ourselves. We want to share our story in hopes that other people can also share in this life-giving message. She had no idea, as she set out that day, that she'd encounter Jesus. And yet, they meet at the well. Jesus shows her that her deepest desires are not for the things of this world, but for a love that transcends this world; a love that created this world.

On this Third Sunday of Lent, ponder your heart's deepest desires. What do you long for? Are our desires greater than a new iPhone, the next meal, the most recent flirtation, or the latest trip to an exotic location. These might all be good things, but they can never fill the God-shaped hole in our heart. Guess who can? Yup. God can.

Our sins, when we think about, are merely misplaced desire for God. As I've written before, everybody worships. but far too often this worship gets

something or someone who is NOT GOD. Sin always seems like the more fun choice, until, over time, sin makes us miserable. Joy is a fruit of the Holy Spirit, and this is the Holy Spirit we received when holy water washed over us at Baptism.

This is the life-giving water Jesus offers. He thirsts only that we thirst for Him; for a peace the world cannot give. Yes, Jesus knows our sins just as he knows the sins of the woman at the well. But notice that Jesus does not start berating her. Not at all. Instead, he is helping her see that the love she has been looking for all along can be found in Christ - the Messiah.

Lent is a time for us to take notice of how we each in some way look for love in all the wrong places. Lent is a time to repent of our sins. Lent is a time to refocus ourselves on Christ.

Friends, our faith is good news. Love is stronger than death. Love is thirsting for you. How are you receiving this love? How are you responding? How are you sharing this love?

# ANNOUNCEMENT TO ALL TWO HOLY MARTYRS PARISHIONERS

Our parish has entered a five-year lease agreement for the weekly use of our St. René Goupil school building.

Two Holy Martyrs in cooperation with the Archdiocese of Chicago have leased the building to MENTA. This is an organization founded by Bob Neubeck and Karen Evans to help children who were not achieving their potential in a traditional classroom setting.

The MENTA group has evolved over time into a dynamic, responsive, multistate education non-profit that operates numerous private and public/private partnership schools.

The school will operate Monday through Friday. Buses will arrive in the morning to drop off students, and buses will return in the afternoon to transport the students home. School staff will use the rear parking lot on the St. René campus. The enrollment is almost unheard of in the Archdiocese of will be roughly 100-150 students. A couple Chicago at this time. times a week, the MENTA students will also

use the gymnasium on our St. Symphorosa Let's revisit recent history. In the year campus. Our parish will still use the school building for certain evening and weekend events.

As pastor, in conjunction with parish staff and parish leadership, we wanted a tenant for the St. René school building that would create a win-win relationship. We did not want to lease the building to just any group rented the school building for Friday or organization. Although we are not directly involved in MENTA school affairs, we do agree in the mission of MENTA to educate and form students who are not succeeding in a traditional school setting.

In return, MENTA pays Two Holy Martyrs Parish a monthly rent. Over the course of five years, this will assist the parish with revenue that exceeds one million dollars. MENTA will also share in utility expenses and in various capital projects related to the building. This kind of rental agreement

2015, St. René School was closed via a decision by Archdiocese of Chicago leadership. Since 2015, the St. René school building has been used for monthly bingo and various social events. Many of the classrooms have also been used once or twice a week for Faith Formation of our children. For a few years, a Polish school evenings and on Saturday.

This relationship with MENTA puts the school building to daily use and also generates much-needed revenue for the parish. My hope is that all of us can support this relationship. We are providing a space for education and formation, we are improving the building, and we are generating revenue that can help our parish move forward on mission well beyond the year 2050.

# FR. MATT'S REFLECTION



"Prove it." How often that is the response to what sound like preposterous claims: "Prove it." Maybe it is an advertisement about a wonder drug; maybe an acquaintance or coworker is

telling us about a fantastic sounding investment; maybe it is a spam email or message about some kind of prize or award, which we have supposedly won, despite not having heard of the organization or entered such the contest. Before believing these too good to be true proposals, we rightly would expect some evidence of their validity, that the claimant "prove it." When confronted with this expectation, the other person might have to admit an error. Maybe this person is well intentioned but has been duped and unwittingly is perpetuating a falsehood. Or, maybe the claimant is purposely trying to deceive us and will move on when meeting with resistance and prudent skepticism.

Similarly, some people might have challenged us with regard to our faith: "Prove it," prove that God is real, that Jesus rose from the dead, etc. Even within our own interior life, that desire, that God prove His presence, prove what we hear from the Bible, might arise from time to time. Such a question does not mean that we have sinned. Religious faith, by and large, is not proven as math formulas demonstrate on paper or physics experiments demonstrate in laboratories. Hence, it is understandable when we might experience the desire that God prove His presence with us, His love for us.

In the readings for this Third Sunday of Lent, that desire, "prove it," is addressed by some of our ancestors in faith. For example, during the Exodus, we are told, "In those days, in their thirst for water, the people grumbled against Moses, saying, 'Why did you ever make us leave Egypt? Was it just to have us die here of thirst with our children and our livestock?' ... The place was called Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites guarreled there and tested the LORD. saying, 'Is the LORD in our midst or not?'" (Exodus 17:3, 7) During a period of desperation, of intense thirst, the Israelites want God to prove that God is with them and true to His word.

Centuries later, the Psalmist looks back to this event and recognizes the hardness of the people's hearts: "Oh, that today you would hear his voice: 'Harden not your hearts as at Meribah, as in the day of Massah in the desert, Where your fathers tempted me; they tested me though they had seen my works." (Psalm 95:8-9) From a more comprehensive perspective, he recognizes that the Israelites had forgotten or ignored what God had already done for them by the time that they are in the desert, that God had freed them from slavery, granted them safe passage across the Red Sea, and already provided them with food. Instead of asking Moses to petition God for water, this large body seems quick to complain and to question God's fidelity to them, in essence, asking the Almighty to prove His presence and love for them.

By contrast, the Samarian woman (the Woman at the Well), does not demand proofs from Jesus but rather responds receptively to His requests and statements, even if they are initially puzzling: "Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' ... The Samaritan woman said to him, 'How can you, a Jew, ask me,

a Samaritan woman, for a drink?'—For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.—Jesus answered and said to her, 'If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, "Give me a drink," you would have asked him and he would have given you living water.'" (John 4:7, 9-10) He then adds, "'Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life.'" (John 4:13-14). What follows is natural and reasonable. "The woman said to him, 'Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water.'" (John 4:15) The woman does not begin with a demand for proof but instead asks for the "living water," which Jesus references. As this entire exchange continues, additional Samaritans begin to believe in Jesus, not by His acceding to any demands, which they make, but as St. John describes, "Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him because of the word of the woman who testified, 'He told me everything I have done.' When the Samaritans came to him, they invited him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. Many more began to believe in him because of his word, and they said to the woman, 'We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world."

What we believe and pray: Consider, do we demand proofs from God or humbly ask for what we need? What to stop doing, sins to avoid: Not be quick to despair or complain. What to do: Pause and recall when God has been present and which blessings might have been overlooked.

"And behold, I [Jesus] am with you always, until the end of the age." - MATTHEW 28:20


