This year is one in which the Fourth Sunday of Advent immediately moves into our celebration of the Nativity of the Lord (Christmas). So, yes, if Advent seems like it flew by, you'd be correct.

Our patient waiting culminates in our remembrance of the Incarnation of God just hours after lighting the fourth candle of the Advent wreath. Our hearts are joyful because we know we are not alone. God is with us. That is what the name Emmanuele means (God with us). Divinity has taken to itself human flesh. God arrives on earth in a very visible, personal way as a vulnerable baby in a manger, a place where animals ate their food.

This is all part of the greatest story ever told. It's the story of the long-awaited Messiah emerging from within the people of Israel as Savior of the world. We as human beings were not going to be able to "fix" the problem of sin, evil and death on our own. God, however, could do something, and God has done something; something mysterious, something miraculous, something supernatural.

And to this we way, "Amen!"

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him

might not perish but might have eternal life." (John 3:16).

We might have a difficult time wrapping our human minds around the story of salvation. How? Why? These are legitimate questions, but the answer is simple. The Answer is Love.

When we truly begin to see the story of salvation as a love story, it changes things. Faith becomes our response to the God who first loved us. How are you responding to God's love? What does it look like in your everyday life?

One way in which we respond to God's love is by regularly thanking God for the gift of salvation; the gift of God the Son. We do this in a special way when we gather weekly to participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. We celebrate the Eucharist. We recall that the word Eucharist means "thanksgiving."

At Holy Mass, we literally receive the Body and Blood of Jesus the Christ in Holy Communion. We do not consume bread and wine. We reverently consume the same Jesus who once lay helpless in a manger. He is now supernatural food for us; the Bread of Life.

My dear friends, as the secular culture continues to edit Christ out of Christmas, may we each lean in more and more and commit to our faith. What do we believe to be true? What do you believe to be true?

Here is our simple but mysteriously deep answer. Allow me to paraphrase the words of St. Iranaeus, who wrote, "He (Christ) became what we are (human) so that we might become what He is." That statement should make each one of us say "Wow!"

It might be tough for us to hear, but we (human beings) are not going to be able to "fix" things on our own. Only human pride and arrogance believes we can suddenly "fix the world." God the Father, however, sent us what we need. Is Jesus, however, what we want?

The Paschal Mystery of Christ (suffering, death, resurrection and ascension) opens for us the way to eternal life. In the Person of Jesus, heaven has touched earth. Sin, evil and death have been eternally conquered. We needed outside help, and God sent the help we need.

For this reason, we can sing joy to the world, the Lord is come, let Earth receive her king. Let every heart prepare Him room. And heaven and nature sing. And heaven and nature sing.

Merry Christmas, my dear friends. May the good Lord bless you and your loved ones.

the Prophets are read. After the reader has finished his task, the one presiding gives an address, urgently admonishing his hearers to practice these beautiful teachings in their lives."

He goes on to describe how petitions are said, gifts of bread and wine are offered and consecrated, and then how the people receive the bread that has become the Eucharist. The presider addressing the people is an essential aspect to the liturgy and to the Christian life. The Roman Missal (the book the priest uses during Mass) states it like this:

"The Homily is part of the Liturgy ... and is necessary for the nurturing of the Christian life. It should be an explanation of some aspect of the readings from Sacred Scripture or of another text from the Ordinary or the Proper of the Mass of the day and should take into account both the mystery being celebrated and the particular needs of the listeners."

When Fr. Bob and I (or any visiting priest) prepare to give the homily, we start with the texts themselves. Each Mass has its own particular set of readings. We don't start with stories or teachings and then apply them to the readings of the day. Rather, we sit in prayer and allow the Word of God to speak to us. Often, particular phrases or themes pop out as the Holy Spirit directs our hearts. Then, the Spirit reminds us of some aspect of Church doctrine or history, as well as the things that we know you as the parishioners of Two Holy Martyrs are experiencing.

Each priest spends time in seminary and the early years of being a priest to develop a style. Sometimes, certain styles resonate more with us than others, but every priest has something valuable to say if he is truly allowing the Holy Spirit to guide his preparation and delivery.


Fr. Bob and I strive to read and continue forming our minds in the life of the Church and her teachings. Leaving seminary should not be the end of growing our life of prayer and maturing intellectually through reading books and listening to audio about the Christian life.

As the people of God, you deserve to have priests who spend time in prayer preparing to break open the Word of God for and with you during the Mass. Hold us to this! If it every seems like we aren't giving our whole selves in preaching the homily or that we are becoming stale in our content, tell us. The homily is a time to understand more deeply God's will and plan for us and how to encounter him in our daily lives. Woe to the priest who does not take this responsibility seriously!

Every believer has the opportunity at Mass to listen to the Word of God being proclaimed and let it settle into their heart. There are many ways to interpret the texts and see how they speak to our current cultural context and our individual lives. The same Scripture passages can hit us in different ways at various times in our lives. We are human – we change, grow, mature, and advance in both physical and spiritual age.

In her wisdom, the Church provides a space during the Mass in which someone who is trained can help to explain the readings we hear as they are applied to our daily lived experiences. This has been the case since the very earliest days of the Church. Peter and the apostles give a number of "sermons" in the Acts of the Apostles that present scripture that is known to the listener but applies it to the life of Jesus Christ. Check out this description of the Mass from the year 170 AD as written by St. Justin Martyr:

"And on that day which is called after the sun, all who are in the towns and in the country gather together for a communal celebration. And then the memoirs of the Apostles or the writings of
