FR. BOB'S WEEKLY BLOG



How easy it is for us mere mortals to be tempted away from God. And if we can be tempted away from God, it soon follows that we are then tempted away from our fellow human beings.

This is always the modus operandi of the Adversary: to pull us out of relationship with God and out of relationship with one another. The Greek word diabolos basically means to tear apart; to separate. The diabolic one is not only a liar and murderer, but also a divider.

In contrast, the one God who is the Creator all of that exists, is whole; an undivided Trinity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. There is no conflict within the Godhead, and Jesus, the Second Person of the Trinity, prays that we be one as He and the Father are one. This is our invitation to live our lives IN UNION WITH CHRIST.

The penitential season of Lent is under way. Our Gospel this Sunday presents to us Jesus being tempted by the Devil in the wilderness. The Lord does not succumb to temptations. Jesus stays focused on the will of God the Father as the Sly One pokes around potential areas of vulnerability.

During Lent, we once again return to the wilderness. We get back to basics. We pray. We fast. We give alms. We each need to take an honest look at our respective lives and if we are in right relationship with God. It's easy, amidst the demands of life, to get spiritually lazy (sloth). We lose zest for the things of God. We risk slipping into despair or angst. We worry about what might happen. The heralding of the good news of salvation gets drowned out by our ratings-driven denizens of despair who love to show us each day "how bad things are."

Lent is to a time to catch ourselves and regain a laser-like focus on Jesus, and to seek reconciliation if we have drifted far from his love. The Lord is kind and merciful, but we must do our part in the reconciling process. Please consider making use of the sacrament of Reconciliation during Lent. This sacrament, along with the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, are HEALING sacraments.

Also, please become conscious of the ways in which "the tempter" uses to distract you and get you out of relationship. The fishhook analogy is helpful. Seldom will a fish bite a hook without bait on it. What does the angler do? He puts a specific bait on the hook to fool the fish.

We each need to know what the tempter uses to "hook" us. Different bait for different people. Becoming aware of our temptations helps us to better understand what's going on in the spiritual life, and this helps us make choices. We say "Yes" to what is of God, and way say "No" so what is not of God."

And that, my friends, is the essence of the spiritual life. Saying YES to God and being in UNION with Christ. Sin is always a lack of gratitude toward God's love. Sin basically says, "God's will is not enough for me." And then we choose something which ultimately is not good for us. Sin affects our relationship with God, with others, and with our own self. God's mercy can restore all three.

Dear Holy Spriit. Help us to see things more clearly. To love God dearly. To follow Christ more nearly.

PARISH STRUCTURE REMINDER

We are approaching three years as Two Holy Martyrs Parish. This new chapter began July 1, 2020 when St. Symphorosa Parish and St. Rene Goupil Parish were canonically suppressed, and the new parish emerged.

We are one parish with two campuses, and one pastor assigned as shepherd of the one flock. Although the parish name is Two Holy Martyrs, the two church buildings retain their original names. Our church located at 62nd street and Austin is St. Symphorosa. Our church located at 64th and New England Avenue is St. Rene Goupil.

The past three years have been spent

unifying many aspects of the parish in terms of how things operate on a regular basis. This included: bank accounts, ministries, signage, liturgy, employees, etc.. In many ways, this process continues as we make decisions as to how things will operate as a parish going forward into the decades ahead.

As pastor, I am aware this change has not been easy for many folks. There is the human part of us that says, "I just want it to be like it was before." Trust me, I get it. However (and we knew there'd be a however) for our parish to continue the mission of sharing the Good News of Salvation, we must move forward with a united heart under the inspiration of St. Symphorosa and her Seven Sons, and St. Rene Goupil and the North American martyrs.

I will occasionally hear from a parishioner who says, "But Fr. Bob, this is how we always did it here." Well, here's the thing. We have two histories of doing things to draw from. There are the way folks at St. Rene did certain things, and there are the way folks at St. Sym's did things. Which do we do?

Here's the thing; we are now being invited to decide how we are going to do things at Two Holy Martyrs parish. We draw from our wonderful histories. We look at what works and what doesn't work, and then we make current-day decisions in the interest of the common good of every parishioner, not as individuals or as specific groups.

Our common worship of the Lord will continue to bring us together as brothers and sisters in Christ. The Eucharist serves as an adhesive that brings together as one those who are many in personalities, talents, histories, and appearance. Jesus molds us together as authentic disciples making our pilgrim way Home.

Jesus will bring everything to fruition at the end of time. He says, "Behold! I make all things new." This is the hope that fires our mission today as we serve our people and our community in the Clearing/Garfield Ridge area of Chicago. This is our mission ground. Right here. Right now. Forward, together forward.

FR. MATT'S REFLECTION



Throughout Lent, we will meet and worship God with a wealth of people: one another as fellow parishioners, visitors to our parish or perhaps those we will meet by going to

another parish, and the holy women and men of the Scriptures and Christendom. This very day we return to our first parents, Adam and Eve, recalling their creation and their sin in disobeying God, not trusting His word. Had the Bible ended here, we would be in a miserable and chaotic state. Blessedly, God, though allowing Adam and Eve to suffer the consequences of their actions, does not eternally reject them or humanity. Similarly, although the Season of Lent demands more of us than any other liturgical season, it, too, is not perpetual, it is not God rejecting or punishing us, but allowing us the opportunity to return to and become reconciled with Him as He also offers to Adam and Eve.

Part of the divine revelation about this opportunity for returning to and becoming reconciled with God is portrayed for us in the Gospel Reading, specifically, the account of Jesus' experience of temptation. St. Matthew describes that Jesus "fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was hungry. The tempter approached and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command that these stones become loaves of bread.' (Matthew 4:3-4) Satan's first temptation is for Jesus is to change stones into bread, appealing to the natural feeling of hunger, which is the more acute for our Lord as He has just come from the desert and His forty days and nights of fasting in the presence of the Father and the Holy Spirit. This attempt to

lead Jesus into sin by abusing His divine power is reminiscent of the appeal to the appetites of Adam and Eve to abuse the freedom and ability, which God has given to them. Adam and Eve yield to this craving: "The woman saw that the tree was good for food," despite having all the food they could want already available to them. By contrast Jesus rejects this temptation to use a supernatural means to feed Himself.

The Tempter then tries to use Scripture to deceive Jesus: "Then the devil took him to the holy city, and made him stand on the parapet of the temple, and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down. For it is written: He will command his angels concerning you and with their hands they will support you, lest you dash your foot against a stone.'" (Matthew 4:5-6) Again, we hear an echo of the temptation of Adam and Eve and Satan's misdirection of the them, "The serpent asked the woman, 'Did God really tell you not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent: 'We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; it is only about the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden that God said, "You shall not eat it or even touch it, lest you die."' But the serpent said to the woman: 'You certainly will not die!'" (Genesis 3:1-4) Satan deceives Adam and Eve with a half-truth. They will not immediately after eating the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil; however, the rupture in the relationship with God because of eating this fruit will eventually result in death. Jesus sees through this misdirection and manipulation, choosing not to put God His Father "'" to the test."'" (Matthew 4:7)

The third temptation of Jesus appeals to pride, avarice, even envy, under guise of an offer of something good: "Then the devil took him up to a very high mountain, and showed him all the kingdoms of the world in their magnificence,

and he said to him, 'All these I shall give to you, if you will prostrate yourself and worship me.'" (Matthew 4:8-9) Although He could be a good ruler (multiple times, people will propose that He take civil leadership of Israel), our Lord knows that world belongs to God, not Satan. In Genesis, the snake also stirs pride, avarice, and envy in Adam and Eve: "'God knows well that the moment you eat of it [the forbidden fruit] your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods who know what is good and what is evil.' The woman saw that the tree was ... pleasing to the eyes, and desirable for gaining wisdom.' (Genesis 3:5, 6) Adam and Eve do not need to know good from evil as that knowledge belongs to God who has already created and provided for them, sparing them this knowledge, since evil had not yet entered their world.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul summarizes this contrast between Adam's and Eve's fall and Jesus' justifying sacrifice, including His rejection of Satan and his temptations: "In conclusion, just as through one transgression condemnation came upon all, so, through one righteous act, acquittal

through one righteous act, acquittal and life came to all. For just as through the disobedience of the one man the many were made sinners, so, through the obedience of the one, the many will be made righteous." (Romans 5:18-19)

What we believe and pray: Do we believe that God knows us, our temptations, and is ready to aid us? What to stop doing, sins to avoid: Pause to ask God which sins, if you are guilty of any, are the ones He first wants you to reject, as Jesus Himself does.

What to do: Persevere in those sacrifices, that fasting, which will grant you more freedom in God.






