R. BOB'S WEFKLY BLC



An old friend called me a few weeks ago right around the time Pope Benedict XVI died. Our phone conversation drifted into the realm of our past few popes. She offered some

brief opinions of John Paul II, Benedict XVI and Francis. This was interesting because this person has not engaged the faith in decades, and the only information she would have received about these three popes would be through the standard news media or what other people said to her about these popes.

As a side note, John XXIII, Paul VI and John Paul I didn't get a mention.

I could tell she liked John Paul II, didn't like Benedict XVI and, for the most part, liked Francis, but she wasn't totally certain. I sat back and listened. I was tempted to ask, "Well, what do you think about Jesus? Thumbs up or thumbs down?" Thankfully, I restrained

Welcome to our world of likes and dislikes; friending and unfriending.

Our second reading this Sunday challenges us to remember that Christ is the center of our faith. How easily we can forget this and then declare ourselves followers of some fellow human being; someone who has quirks and flaws just like each of us.

St. Paul gets at this temptation in his first letter to the Corinthians.

"For it has been reported to me about you, my brothers and sisters, by Chloe's people, that there are rivalries among you. I mean that each of you is saying, 'I belong to Paul,' or 'I belong to Apollos,' or 'I belong to Cephas,' or 'I belong to Christ.' Is Christ divided?"

The great UNIFIER of our faith is Jesus, the Christ, by the power of the Holy Spirit. The Lord's prayer to the Father is that we be one as he and the Father are One. Christ desires we remain in his challenged to drop our spiritual anchor

We as humans like to complicate things, and far too often, egos get in the way. Humility gets pushed aside in favor of pride. "Me first" over God first. Pretty soon we sound like the people of Corinth. "I belong to Fr. Pfleger. I belong to Bishop Barron. I belong to Fr. James Martin. I belong to Cardinal Raymond Burke." Raymond Burke."

We're reminded what Jesus said. "Follow me!"

Every pope, every bishop, every priest, every deacon, every religious brother or sister, every lay person must be a servant of the Lord. We ascent to Christ; he who is the way, and the truth, and the life. This is how we maintain authentic unity in the Church. We look FIRST to him and we call upon to Holy Spirit to guide us in truth and in love.

Of course, there is an Adversary at work cardinal, bishop, priest, deacon, who likes to play little devilish games. This Enemy's goal is to separate us from God, separate us from each other, and separate us from our own self. Sadly, this Thing is doing a pretty good job today because so many have turned away from God, or grown distant from God. Hatred of the sacred fills in where love used to be. With the unifying love of God out of the picture, we create our selfish fortresses and prepare for battle. We find a "Them" to serve as scapegoat for all that ails this world; all the while that Thing cackles in perverse delight.

FAITH OVER FEAR

Friends, the near future might be challenging for us as intentional disciples of Jesus. We're reminded, however, of the long litany of disciples spread out over 2,000 years who have also carried the flame of faith even during dark spiritual times. Jesus himself prepares us just as he prepared his first disciples so long ago when he said, "If the world hates you, realize that it hated me first." He added, "If they persecuted me, they will persecute

Things will happen in this world that will shake our faith, if our faith hasn't already been shaken. We are

in the Sacred Heart of Jesus. This firm grounding in Christ helps us stand firm amidst the fickle wind and waves of our day. This is not the time to cut and run and in search of some other safe harbor. The only safe harbor is Christ

My core responsibility as pastor and as priest is the salvation of souls. How easy it can be for a pastor/priest to place temporal (earthly) goods above spiritual needs. We can find ourselves fretting over the future of buildings, property, and finances to the exclusion of the primacy of the spiritual life in parish life. All of our temporal goods are at the service of the spiritual life of the parish. One day our buildings will crumble. Money will be of no use. Love, however, lives on.

We are invited at this time and in this place to stand firm in faith; no matter if we like or don't like a specific pope, religious brother or sister. Mother Church is guided and powered by the Holy Spirit. There have always been wolves in sheep's clothing in the Church; those who seek to use the authority of the Church to advance their own personal agenda. We're reminded and encouraged by all those within Mother Church who seek to do the Lord's will by living the truth in love.

There have been holy men and women through the centuries who have done the Lord's work, and there are men and women today doing the Lord's work throughout the world. You and I are those men and women today called to be a light to the nations, and we each draw that light from the unifying love of Jesus, the Light of the world.

People today are hungry. Folks are desperately longing for authenticity. The glitz and glamour of the world doesn't do it after a while. The buzz of a new technology weans only to expose a deeper thirst; a thirst no earthly river can fully quench. So many people have

FR. MATT'S REFLECTION



"Four score and seven years ago," for those who are familiar with American history and many students in public speaking classes, those words, the beginning of President

Abraham Lincoln's, "Gettysburg Address," are well known, perhaps the most easily recognized from his oratorical catalogue. When asked what Jesus' most famous words are, a wider range of answers might result. We hear some of the Savior's first words, at least those from St. Matthew's Gospel, in the Gospel Reading for this Sunday yet they might not be the ones, which we would expect.

Now, had Jesus spoken before He meets Sts. Peter, Andrew, James, and John, certainly. He is raised with and undoubtedly speaks with the Blessed Mother and St. Joseph, their extended family members, and their neighbors. Even in the verses, which precede the selection of the Gospel, which is proclaimed today, Jesus declines Satan's temptations and rebukes him. All of these examples precede His public ministry, His evangelization. This Sunday, we hear our Lord as He begins to form a new covenant with His people, the Children of Israel, and in fact with all people.

St. Matthew frames Jesus' initial work by referencing St. Isaiah. What we hear from the Prophet in the First Reading is repeated again as Jesus begins preaching in Galilee. Jesus, as St. Matthew presents Him, commences with fulfilling this part of the Father's will, including the area in which He will begin to announce the Good News: "He left Nazareth and went to live in Capernaum by the sea, in the region of Zebulun and Naphtali, that what had been said through Isaiah the prophet might be fulfilled: Land of Zebulun and land of Naphtali, the way to the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles, the people who sit in darkness have seen a great light, on those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death light has arisen." (Matthew 4:13-16)

St. Isaiah's earlier words have been alive in the minds of the faithful of Israel. Christmas Eve, most fittingly, as well as on several other days, the Canticle of Zechariah, taken from St. Luke's Gospel, is read, conveying St. Zechariah's joy at the birth of St. John the Baptist and prophesying what he will accomplish. In particular, at the end of the Canticle, St. Zechariah exclaims, "'for you [St. John the Baptist] will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give his people knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God by which the daybreak from on high will visit us to shine on those who sit in darkness and death's shadow, to guide our feet into the path of peace." (Luke 1:76-79) Notice the similarity of St. Zechariah's description to that of St. Isaiah's prophecy: people sitting in darkness being blessed to see, to be illuminated by light, by daybreak, and death finally being overcome.

St. Zechariah even distinguishes the forgiveness of sins, which is to be accomplished by the Lord and prepared for St. John the Baptist. Having been baptized by St. John and rejected Satan's temptations, our Lord's first public declaration is the initial fulfillment of those earlier words: "From that time on, Jesus began to preach and say, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.'" (Matthew 4:17) Of all that Son of God could begin saying to the world,

He chooses, "'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.'" (Matthew 4:17) This one statement exists in tension. Jesus does not simply say, "Repent," and He does not simply say, "the kingdom of heaven is at hand,"; instead, He unites an action, a disposition, with a supernatural yet hidden disclosure. Demanding repentance without any purpose or explanation could have sounded like a royal imposition or an ominous warning. Announcing that God's kingdom is present when nothing external seems out of the ordinary could have resulted in people thinking Jesus to be delusional.

Together, though, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand," (Matthew 4:17) repeats God's earlier providential work to form a new relationship, a spousal covenant, with His Chosen People. How often in the Old Testament does God bless His people all to see them become complacent, act unfaithfully, suffer from separating themselves from Him, and then repent and return to Him. Jesus will initiate this return to God once again but now by being Emmanuel, God actually with us, forgiving sins, and revealing that God's Kingdom and life with Him will exceed even the earthly Holy Land. This first statement of Jesus' public ministry may not be the one, which first comes to mind when we think of Jesus but it is good for us to be oriented by it once again.

What we believe and pray: Which of Jesus' words come to your minds when you think of Him?

What to stop doing, sins to avoid: Have you neglected daily time with God's word?

What to do: If you have not been reading from God's word, begin today with this Gospel, Matthew, Chapter 4.

"And behold, I [Jesus] am with you always, until the end of the age." - MATTHEW 28:20

What to do at a Holy Hour?

AN EASY TO USE GUIDE ON HOW TO PRAY

Ever try to pray only to soon find out you don't know what to do? Ever visit a Holy Hour in front of the Monstrance and become frustrated because you didn't know what to do?

Here are a few suggestions as to how to make a good holy hour.

MINUTES 0-5: Meditate on the following quote from the Catechism of the Catholic Church: "God calls man first. Man may forget his Creator or hide far from his face; he may run after idols or accuse the deity of having abandoned him; yet the living and true God tirelessly calls each person to that mysterious encounter known as prayer. In prayer, God's initiative of love always comes first; our own first step is always a response." (no. 2567)

MINUTES 5-10: Look in your heart; look at your life. What do you want? What do you really want from God? Tell God right now what you need from Him during this time of prayer.

MINUTES 10-15: Find a passage from the Bible. Maybe it's a Psalm; maybe it's the readings from daily Mass; maybe it's the readings at the upcoming Sunday Mass. Find a passage from Scripture. Read the passage slowly. Get familiar with the text. Read the passage a second time, this time read it even slower. Very, very slowly read the passage a third time. Pay attention to which word, words, or phrases "tug" at your heart or get your attention.

MINUTES 15-25: Think about your life; think about the reality of your life. What are the word, words, or phrases from the Bible speaking to in your life? How does the Bible passage connect to your life? Look deep within.

MINUTES 25-35: Talk to God. Talk to God as if He were a real person. Talk to God like Moses did: "The Lord used to speak to Moses face to face, as one man speaks to another." (Exodus 33:11)

MINUTES 35-45: Listen. God will speak to you. Maybe God will speak to you through a thought in your head ... or a song in your heart or a memory ... or a feeling in your body. Listen with all your senses.

MINUTES 45-50: Return to the Scripture passage again. Read it slowly one more time. Is there any word, words, or phrases that speak to you again?

MINUTES 50-55: What can you do today, this week, to act on what God has revealed to you? Practically speaking, in your real life, what can you do?

MINUTES 55-60: Thank the Lord. Blessings are specific and so should our gratitude. Tell God specifically what you're thankful for.

We are looking forward to seeing all our First Communion Families at the Bread Meeting Celebration!


