This weekend we rest upon the precipice of a new calendar year. Don't forget to write 2024 on your checks (yes, Fr. Bob still uses paper checks on occasion).

Liturgically, however, this Sunday we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. We're mindful that God, in His plan of salvation, chose to come among us within the context of the human family.

God being God, He could have opted for some other way, but instead, he enters His own creation as a vulnerable baby in an obscure corner of the vast Roman Empire. He's born in and through a young Jewish girl with a carpenter for a stepfather.

He enters this world just like you and I came into the world. God makes Himself relatable in the Person of Jesus, the Christ; the long-awaited Messiah. Jesus truly is the face of the Father. God is not an abstraction. God is not impersonal. This story is a love story from beginning to end.

And how will it end?

"God's dwelling is with the human race. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people and God himself will always be with them (as

As we enter this new calendar, may we each consider ways we can deepen our relationship with the Lord. People often make a resolution to eat better and to exercise. That's great. Maybe we need to see Holy Mass as more of a blessing than a burden (meaning we participate every Sunday). Maybe we've been meaning to read sacred scripture more often and ponder God's word. Maybe we need to get out of ourselves more and be attentive to the needs of others.

We become more mindful that we love because God first loved us. Amazing grace!

wrong view of the other and compromised belief in who Jesus really is.

It's fair, right? Tension is uncomfortable. And at the heart of this discomfort is the scandal of the cross. Many of the famous heretics, like Nestorius, couldn't deal with the idea of our all-powerful God dying in the most humiliating way possible. And yes, it is scandalous, but no less true. God's love for the world and humanity did not allow him to stand aside and watch, but drove him to enter into the very messiness of sin and pull us out. In becoming fully one of us, Jesus saved every part of us because he is also God.

The creed ("Credo" is Latin for "I believe") we say every Mass is actually a combination of two post-conciliar creeds, Nicene (325 AD) and Constantinople (381 AD). After rejecting whatever heresies that had led to the council, the bishops issued clear and concise statements that summarized and defined the official teaching of the Church.

Each word of the creed is carefully selected and stated to communicate true doctrine and

belief. We say it during
Mass as a community as a
public profession of our
faith in response to what
we have heard in God's
Word and what we look
forward to in the Liturgy of
the Eucharist. The
Profession of Faith is our
opportunity as God's
people to respond to the
Lord's self-revelation and

salvation proclaimed in scripture.

The word of God should be understood and accepted, or else we become mere passive spectators.

It can seem like we are simply reciting simple beliefs every Sunday when we say the creed together, but it's important to remember that 1) this is our faith, and 2) these words were fought over and carefully considered when they were written in the 4th century. As the Mystical Body of Christ, we as the Church say to God that we have heard him and believe in him and what he has told us. It also is a reminder to us that we can always be tempted to unbelief or to break that careful tension that we hold in our belief in our Trinitarian God and our Savior who became man and dwelt among us.

Now you see why it's so important to hold this tension and profess our faith aloud, and why it's important to learn about what tempted Christians in the past in order to steer clear of those temptations and tendencies ourselves. So next time you say the Creed, give yourself a little pat on the back – you're a champion of truth!

One of the most intense classes we take in seminary is called Christology, which is simply the study of who Jesus Christ is. After Mass, I'd suggest quizzing Fr. Bob or myself what we remember from the class. We were tested on several heresies and councils from the early Church (think years 325 though 600 AD). In these councils, bishops, theologians, and representatives of the pope got together to combat some challenges to Christ's divinity and his humanity. As you know, Jesus is fully God and fully man. This has been well defined since those councils ... so why spend a whole class diving into them?

You'd be surprised to know how often these heresies (aka wrong teachings professed publicly and persistently) pop up even in our own day. You may not realize that we fight off heresy every time we pray the Creed at Mass, which came from these early councils. Heresy is often the result of relieving some tension between these two truths and siding with one over the other: how can one person be both 100% God and 100% man? Those who we now label as ancient heretics were arguing to protect one of the two, but in doing so, they fell into a



A special thank you to the Pacino family for their continued help in delivering the gifts to the charities.


