## FR. BOB'S WEEKLY BLOG



Most folks who attend Holy Mass in our parish know I make regular use of quotes when I preach. For years, I have been writing down in a few journals catchy or thought-

provoking quotes. Some quotes are humorous, while others serve to support what's being preached.

Not everyone wants to be a voracious reader, but even the most bookresistant person can be stopped in their tracks after seeing a good quote; a quote so good it might even alter how we view the human person and the neighbor focused. In the spiritual life, world we live in. A good quote can alter we are served by serving others. "It is in how we view our faith.

The following quote is written on a torn piece of paper, and I seem to have forgotten to write down who said it. Oh well!

"Somehow Christian values cannot be enforced. If they are enforced, they are not Christian anymore. You cannot love your enemy by force. That's tyranny, and that's not love."

Jesus is all about moving us from mere observance of cold external law. The Lord desires to TRANSFORM our hearts so that our discipleship is not limited to merely obeying the law but more about our hearts being united to his Sacred Heart. It is the love of Christ in us that drives our words and actions. In other words, we live FOR LOVE.

Here's an example: the Fifth Commandment is "You Shall not Murder." This is a concrete external law given to us by God. And yet, look at all the murder that surrounds us today. Why aren't people obeying God's law? Jesus gets to the HEART of the matter, literally. In the Beatitudes, the Lord says, "Blessed are the clean of heart, for they shall see God."

In biblical language, the word heart does not mean our physical pumping

heart. Instead, it means the core of our person; the seat of life or strength. It means mind, soul, spirit, or one's entire emotional nature and understanding.

Jesus is a heart doctor, and we need his healing touch. No one likes to be FORCED into obeying. This is why earthly tyranny won't work on everyone. Tyranny tends to work on those who fear the tyrant's threats and brutality. Our faith – Christianity – is a matter of the heart, and our hearts must be centered on Christ himself. He then lives in and through us.

Is this easy? Heck no! We do battle daily with our wounded human nature, that far too often is selfish. We want what we want when we want it. Jesus, in contrast, moves us toward a selflessness that is God focused and giving that we receive. It is in pardoning that we are pardoned." (Prayer of St. Francis).

Jesus is inviting us into a different way of seeing. We begin to SEE that God's love and God's law are connected and that the parameters the Lord is giving us are for our own good and the good of the human race.

What happens to a young child who gets everything he wants when he wants it? We say that child ends up being spoiled. Well, we can sometimes carry this into adulthood. We want what we want when we want it, regardless of if it's God's will. This is not a good road to take in light of the common good.

When Mother Church (guided by sacred scripture and sacred tradition) teaches, she teaches with God's revelation in mind and all of humanity in mind. Mother Church is not Congress, which is heavily influenced by lobbyists who are out for their own special interests.

We are always able to use our freewill to do whatever we want. God gave us this gift. But is what we want to do in line with God's love and God's law? Is what we want to do when we want to do it even good for us?

It all begins in the heart. Ideally, our heart in relationship with Jesus' Sacred Heart.

We call Sunday the Lord's Day, and so

Recall, however, Mark's gospel, chapter two. It reads, "The sabbath was made for man, not man for the sabbath."

This means that the sabbath of the Old Covenant was for the people, and that the sabbath of the New Covenant (Sunday) is also for the people. We need it. God needs nothing. Sunday is a day of rest, worship and family FOR

As Catholics, Holy Mass is our avenue of formal worship that is for our benefit. Again, God does not need our worship. We need God's grace, and Holy Mass is where we worship, and are in turn sanctified.

Unfortunately, in our culture, Sunday has become just another day of the week. Many folks no longer formally worship. Many folks no longer rest. Many folks no longer spend time with family.

Okay, Fr. Bob, now what? We help people rediscover the Sabbath; we help people see that Sunday is for our good, our well-being. Every single human being worships. We are wired for worship. God put it there. The question is ... who or what are we worshipping?

There are folks who no longer worship at a one-hour Mass but have no problem sitting through a three-and-ahalf hour sporting event, or going to a two-hour movie at the theater, or those folks who surf in internet for hours. We make time for what is important to us.

Jesus gives us Holy Mass as pure blessing. He did not intend it to be a burden. He knows we need to worship and he gives us his very own Self as the object of our deepest desire. Happy Sunday!

## FR. MATT'S REFLECTION



When discovering something new, solving a mystery, perhaps even investigating a crime or problem, the dedicated individuals occasionally will describe

their endeavor as analogous, "to peeling back the layers of an onion, laboring to find the core, the soughtafter answer. One layer removed, one step completed, allows access to the next one and so forth until the center, the origin or end is found. For anyone who cooks with onions, peeling the layers not only leads to the core but can progressively release more potent odors. Nearing the end of mystery or the solution to a problem can heighten the sense of urgency and excitement as the conclusion seems imminent. Our Lord knows these conditions of our humanity, our experiences, desires, and communication. As we continue with the Sermon on the Mount in the Gospel Reading for this Sunday, Jesus segues from the Beatitudes, the ways, which lead to happiness in God and those who practice them, to their responsibilities. The Son of God is beginning to peel back the layers of what discipleship will require.

In the second portion of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus does not reference onions but instead chooses salt as a metaphor. Salt seems to have been a familiar seasoning, not a rare spice beyond the experience of the crowds who are listening to Him. Salt, with its distinct flavor (analogous to an onion's characteristic odor), would seem to lose its purpose if, as Jesus cautions, it no longer is characterized with any taste: "You are the salt of the earth.

But if salt loses its taste, with what can it be seasoned? It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot." (Matthew 5:13) Salt is supposed to be noticeable, distinguishable because of its taste.

Shifting from food and the sense of taste, Jesus moves on to light and the sense of sight. Light is integral if objects are to be seen under normal conditions by our eyes. Again, light, whether emitted from the Sun, candles, or oil lamps, probably is familiar to most of the people who are in Jesus' presence. The absence of light would complicate movement then as does even now. One of the properties of light is that it interacts with things to make them and their features, such as color and size, visible to us. We are able to distinguish items, even people, in most instances, predominantly by how they appear, which depends on illumination. Hence, Jesus exhorts those before Him, "You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket; it is set on a lampstand, where it gives light to all in the house. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father." (Matthew 5:14-16)

Both salt and light are ordinary yet distinct. It is on this basis, salt by its nature conveying salty flavor and light by its nature illuminating objects, that they are easily recognizable and perhaps the reason for why Jesus references them as ways of teaching how those who would follow Him are to be ordinary yet distinct. This understanding of Jesus' preaching is part of the commentary proffered by our bishops: "By their deeds the disciples are to influence the world for good. They can no more escape notice than a city set on a mountain. If they fail in good works, they are as useless as

flavorless salt or as a lamp whose light is concealed."

Jesus is not calling for these early inquirers to act ostentatiously in His name, making a public spectacle or upheaval. By contrast, one who is genuinely a disciple of the Word made flesh will be noticeable to others in a way that leads back to Christ and will "'glorify your heavenly Father.'" Differing from salt, which by its nature bears a salty flavor, and light, which by its nature illuminates things, those who would be followers of the Lord will have to choose to persevere in His way, in word and deed, in worship and daily living. St. Paul describes how he has acted as a Christian, a way of being salt and light: "I did not come with sublimity of words or of wisdom. For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. I came to you in weakness and fear and much trembling, and my message and my proclamation were not with persuasive words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of Spirit and power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God." (1 Corinthians 2:1-5)

How, in what specific ways, do we demonstrate that we are Christians? This is a challenging question. To be authentic but not showy, to be distinguishable but not attention-seeking, Jesus has already provided us with some direction: the Beatitudes. What we believe and pray: We are "salt of the earth" and "the light of the world."

What to stop doing, sins to avoid: Being honest with ourselves, do we want to be known as Catholics, why or why not? What to do: Go back to the Beatitudes or St. Paul's first Letter to the Corinthians and learn what they teach us.




