FR. BOB'S WEEKLY BLOG



Some of my personal musical tastes trickle down to me from my parents. Dad was a big I'd wake up on Saturday mornings to my father loudly playing "In the Mood"

by Glenn Miller.

Mom, on the other hand, tended toward easy-listening stuff and the crooners of the day (Al Martino was her favorite). She put on her favorite music, and she tended to the house and us kids. This is how I first encountered Roger Whittaker, the British whistler who lends his voice to just about any popular song. One of his most wellknown songs is "The Last Farewell." WGN-TV used to use the song as their station ID back in the day.

In my perusing of Whittaker songs, I came across "New World in the Morning." The gist of the song is that so many people wait for tomorrow to begin something: lose weight, get more organized, participate in Mass, take a desired vacation, be a more loving person, etc. We shouldn't, however, wait until tomorrow because all we are guaranteed is today.

Here's some of the lyrics:

"I met a man who had a dream he had since he was twenty. I met that man when he was eighty-one. He said too many people just stand and wait up til the morning. Don't they know tomorrow never comes?"

Recovery group folks use a similar mantra. They say, "One day at a time."

During my brief time covering sports, a coach would often be asked to make a comment about an upcoming game three weeks away, and the coach would say, "Right now we're focused this game. We take 'em one at a time."

And so should we. We take life one day at a time. Prepare for the future?

Yes. But take care of what needs takin' care of today. Reach out to family and friends. Let go of grudges. Share a meal with a special person. Spend time with Jesus in prayer. Go to confession. Receive the Eucharist. Send a handwritten note to somebody. Rediscover bands guy, and an old hobby. You get the idea. Don't wait until tomorrow.

> Tomorrow is guaranteed to no one. Far too often we get caught up in busyness, complaining, discouragement, and other things that sap our energy and steal our joy. There are days I need to ask myself, "Am I working for God or for "The Man?" Some days I am not sure. Too many people are in a hurry. To where? It's like the saying, "Got everything done. Died anyways."

St. Francis de Sales has sound spiritual advice for you and for me. He wrote, "Never be in a hurry; do everything quietly and in a calm spirit. Do not lose your inner peace for anything whatsoever, even if your whole world seems upset. What is anything in life compared to peace of soul."

Amen, brother! One day at a time.

There are days I struggle. We struggle together because this is the Church Jesus has given to us; a Church that is both DIVINE and institutional.

We're reminded that Jesus will be the one who separates the weeds and the wheat at the end of time. There will be justice. There will be mercy. We can leave the judgment of our eternal souls to God. In the meantime, we can each do our part to help purify Mother

FR. MATT'S REFLECTION



When to put away the Christmas decorations, people respond to that seasonal transition at different times. For some people, the Solemnity of Mary, the

Most Holy Mother of God, 1 January, is the day. For some families, a day or two before children return to school is the customary time. In some cultures, for example, Catholics from eastern European countries, the Christmas decorations remain displayed through the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord (Candlemas), on 2 February, to commemorate the fortieth day after Jesus' birth. Whatever your own personal choice, eventually, the Advent and Christmas displays are set aside until the next Advent and Christmas. This Second Sunday in Ordinary Time is one of the last vestiges of Christmas for us, a transition from our Lord's youthful years and hidden early adulthood into Ordinary time as we follow Him at the beginning of His public ministry. Prominent in this transition is St. John the Baptist.

The Baptist, the Forerunner of our Lord, is pivotal in preparing the People of Israel for Jesus' arrival. After this Sunday, we will not hear much more about the son of Sts. Zechariah and Elizabeth. Today, though, St. John bridges the Seasons of Advent and Christmas with the Ordinary Time of the Redeemer's public life. The bulk of the Gospels consists of what Jesus teaches and accomplishes in the presence of others: the Apostles, individuals who approach Him, larger groups of disciples, and even throngs of people, such as during the

multiplication of the loaves and fish or on the Road to Calvary. Before Jesus evangelizes, heals, and forgives, St. John the Baptist will announce Him to his, that is, St. John's own disciples and by extension to us.

The Gospel reading for this Sunday is a rare example of a selection in which we do not hear Jesus speak; instead, St. John the Baptist is the primary evangelist. Let us return to what the last of the Prophets says about the One who has come into the world: "John the Baptist saw Jesus coming toward him and said, 'Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. He is the one of whom I said, "A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me." I did not know him, but the reason why I came baptizing with water was that he might be made known to Israel. ... Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God.'" (John 1:29-31, 34) St. John the Baptist is humble before Christ and demonstrates that virtue amid those who had begun to follow him. St. John avoids the sin of jealousy, not trying to possess people or keep them from the Son of God but faithfully to usher people toward the Christ.

Confessing that Jesus is indeed the One "On whomever you see the Spirit come down and remain, he is the one who will baptize with the Holy Spirit," (John 1:33) is an act of obedience as well. Although that word, "obedience," is dismissed by some as outdated or contradictory to one's freedom and preferences, the Baptist's obedience is an act of charity, seeking the good of the people entrusted to him by "the one who sent me [St. John] to baptize." (John 1:33) Unlike St. Isaiah the Prophet who foretells the eventual coming of God's "servant" who will "raise up the tribes of Jacob, and restore the survivors of Israel;

I will make you a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth," (Isaiah 49:6) the Forerunner can actually point to the one prophesied by St. Isaiah and say, "'Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29) There is no indication of rivalry or jealousy on the part of St. John the Baptist toward Jesus. Envy that he does not rank first does not taint the Baptist's relationship with Jesus or the Father. All the more, this man who is a distant relation of Jesus (St. Mary and St. Elizabeth being cousins) shows himself to be a model disciple makes his earlier testimony credible.

Across so much news and information today, whether sensationalized, selfaggrandized, or spurious, how often do we hear of or detect someone imitating St. John the Baptist, fulfilling some activity "that he [Jesus] might be made known"? That is one way, following St. John's model, in which we might adjust our own actions and motivations, so that we might make Jesus better known to the world.

What we believe and pray: If someone asks you who Jesus is, what would you

What to stop doing, sins to avoid: Jealousy (being possessive of what we have or desire to have; keeping others from it) and envy (resentment, even sadness, at what someone else possesses to the point of forsaking charity) (paraphrasing Dr. Jared Staudt's distinction (Accessed on 9 January 2023, https://thosecatholicmen.com/articles/ envy-and-jealousy/.)

What to do: Rejoice for someone else's success or blessings. Tell, or at least be ready to tell, of the good that someone else has accomplished, not in a disingenuous manner but in a way that conveys good news and reveals a little of God's work among us.

What to do at a Holy Hour?

AN EASY TO USE GUIDE ON HOW TO PRAY

Ever try to pray only to soon find out you don't know what to do? Ever visit a Holy Hour in front of the Monstrance and become frustrated because you didn't know what to do?

Here are a few suggestions as to how to make a good holy hour.

MINUTES 0-5: Meditate on the following quote from the Catechism of the Catholic Church: "God calls man first. Man may forget his Creator or hide far from his face; he may run after idols or accuse the deity of having abandoned him; yet the living and true God tirelessly calls each person to that mysterious encounter known as prayer. In prayer, God's initiative of love always comes first; our own first step is always a response." (no. 2567)

MINUTES 5-10: Look in your heart; look at your life. What do you want? What do you really want from God? Tell God right now what you need from Him during this time of prayer.

MINUTES 10-15: Find a passage from the Bible. Maybe it's a Psalm; maybe it's the readings from daily Mass; maybe it's the readings at the upcoming Sunday Mass. Find a passage from Scripture. Read the passage slowly. Get familiar with the text. Read the passage a second time, this time read it even slower. Very, very slowly read the passage a third time. Pay attention to which word, words, or phrases "tug" at your heart or get your attention.

MINUTES 15-25: Think about your life; think about the reality of your life. What are the word, words, or phrases from the Bible speaking to in your life? How does the Bible passage connect to your life? Look deep within.

MINUTES 25-35: Talk to God. Talk to God as if He were a real person. Talk to God like Moses did: "The Lord used to speak to Moses face to face, as one man speaks to another." (Exodus 33:11)

MINUTES 35-45: Listen. God will speak to you. Maybe God will speak to you through a thought in your head ... or a song in your heart or a memory ... or a feeling in your body. Listen with all your senses.

MINUTES 45-50: Return to the Scripture passage again. Read it slowly one more time. Is there any word, words, or phrases that speak to you again?

MINUTES 50-55: What can you do today, this week, to act on what God has revealed to you? Practically speaking, in your real life, what can you do?

MINUTES 55-60: Thank the Lord. Blessings are specific and so should our gratitude. Tell God specifically what you're thankful for.








BELONGING SERVICE


