

The readings that follow in the days and weeks after Easter offer us powerful witness to the truth of the Resurrection.

This weekend we hear the Road to Emmaus story in which two of Jesus' disciples are walking away from Jerusalem toward a town seven miles away called Emmaus. Along the way Jesus joins them but at first they did not recognize the Lord.

Jesus covertly shares with them how all of scripture and the prophets of old pointed to Christ. Jesus is the long-awaited Messiah and the fulfillment of all prophecy.

The powerful moment of the passage, however, occurs when the disciples invite Jesus to "Stay with us." It was late in the day. While He was at table with them, He took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to them.

That's when it hit them. "It's Jesus!" He vanished from their sight; leaving only Himself in the Eucharist. He was present to them now in the Sacrament (a visible sign of an invisible grace).

Then they realized how when they were walking with Him and listening to Jesus explain the scriptures their hearts were burning. His Word touches their souls and piqued their desire for more.

Here is a key motion from this passage; once the disciples realized it was the Risen Lord, they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem. They changed direction. An encounter with the Lord does just that it changes our life direction.

We may be heading in the wrong direction even though we "go to church" every week. Mere attendance inside a church building does not necessarily mean we're heading toward Jerusalem. Our hearts must be set on Christ: His way, His truth, His life. We want to immerse ourselves in Sacred Scripture, trusting the Holy Spirit to inspire us.

We also gather around the Lord's table and witness at Holy Mass the same four movements: took, blessed, broke and gave. Those four verbs happen at every Mass. The priest takes the gifts, he blesses them, breaks them and then gives them. This echoes the movements of Jesus when he fed the thousands on the grass, fed the Apostles at the Last Supper, and also the disciples at Emmaus.

Took - Blessed - Broke - Gave.

Some of us experience heart burn after consuming a certain kind of food. That's the kind of heart burn we want to avoid. However, we want the kind of heart burn the two disciples in the Emmaus story experienced -- our hearts on fire when Sacred Scripture moves us in a way that helps us see truth; specifically the truth of the Resurrection. Also, our hearts on fire for the Gift of Finest Wheat (the Eucharist).

#### When, Father, When?

When will the Eucharist be available? As of this writing (04/18/20) the honest



answer is "I do not know." The public suspension of Holy Mass across the Archdiocese of Chicago (and other dioceses) comes to the parishes from the bishop, who in cooperation with civil authorities deemed it necessary to suspend the public gathering we call Holy Mass.

The "not knowing" can be frustrating. I feel your hunger. Right now, our church properties are officially closed and not accessible to the public. For this I apologize. Yes, these decisions are for safety, but one also senses that these decisions are also made to prevent lawsuits. Sadly, we live in a very litigious society where some folks can't wait to sue someone or some institution.

As soon as we hear anything, we will communicate to the people of St. Rene through our website (www.strenegoupil.org), the sign by the school building, postings on the front doors of the church, and, of course, word of mouth.

This has been a very difficult time. The concern about the virus is one thing, but one senses something else going on. We can't quite put our finger on it, but some of us sense there's more taking place then what is being portrayed by our media (who are ratings driven) and our elected leaders.

We are human beings, not hamsters. It is not healthy to stay inside all the time. I am very concerned about our sanity, our psychological health, and our spiritual life. We need

social interaction. We need fresh air. We need a sense of freedom. These are all being challenged as we balance healthy/safety concerns with our basic human needs.

Mary. Mother of God, pray for us.

# **Our Catholic Faith** By Fr. Bob Regan

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and behold, I am with you always, to the close of the age." Matthew 28:19-20

The late spiritual guru Wayne Dyer used to say "Don't believe everything you think."

He's right. Not all our thoughts are true, nor are all our thoughts healthy. And yet, our thoughts are powerful. What's going on inside our head plays a major role in what become our words and our actions.

Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, "Sow a thought and you reap an action; sow an act and you reap a habit; sow a habit and you reap a character; sow a character and you reap a destiny."

Throughout the course of a day, numerous thoughts go in and out of our minds. Think of all the things you think about during a 24-hour period. You wake up and the thoughts begin all the way until evening when you set your head upon your pillow. Then we dream. "I haven't thought about that person in years. Why were they in my dream?"

We, as human beings, need to be aware of our thoughts. We do our best to understand our thoughts. If they are of God and the things of God, we accept and nurture those thoughts. If they are of the Evil One (the enemy of God and of human beings), then we reject and discard those.

This is easier said than done. It takes some effort on our part while cooperating with God's grace, to nurture life-giving thoughts and reject dark, deathembracing thoughts.

Just because you have a thought doesn't mean it's yours. You could be walking along the sidewalk minding your own business when you see someone you don't really like. All of a sudden you have a really awful thought about that person, and wish them ill-will.

You say to yourself "Oh my! Where did that come from?" Well, it's not of God, that's for sure. And it is likely not you. Our faith tradition teaches that the angels of darkness can affect our thoughts. They cannot control your behavior or your freewill, and so want to introduce thoughts into your mind, and hope that instead of rejecting and discarding the thought, you begin to spend too much time on the thought, which soon becomes a spoken word or action.

Elder Thaddeus wrote a book called "Our Thoughts Determine Our Lives." In it he says "Everything, both good and evil, comes from our thoughts. Our thoughts become reality."

Although a thought may not have originally been ours, we "sign-on" to the thought by feeding it; spending more time on it, etc. We use our freewill (the ability to choose) to foster the thought; to nurture it, and now it becomes ours. This is why it is so important to be aware of our thoughts during the day and to not believe everything we think.

We must discern our thoughts. 1. Be aware. 2. Seek to understand. 3. Accept or reject.

Having a daily disciplined prayer life goes a long way toward being able to discern the things of God and the things that are not of God. Making time for silence and stillness helps counter the noise and hyperactivity of the culture. There is a reason the Enemy fosters a noisy busy society. It distances us from God and disturbs our mind and soul.

Elder Thaddeus gives us a challenge. He writes, "Our starting point is always wrong. Instead of beginning with ourselves, we always want to change others first and ourselves last. If everyone were to begin first with themselves, then there would be peace all around."

Plenty to think about right? No pun intended.

Wayne Dyer was right. Don't believe everything you think. Instead, test it. Discern its origin. Of God? Nurture it. Of the Enemy? Reject it.

I miss.....


